#### Get to Know the Presenters: Cassie Barlow

Dr. Cassie B. Barlow is the President of the Southwestern Ohio Council for Higher Education. Through SOCHE's multiple programs, Dr. Barlow is focused on collaboration among SOCHE's 23 College and University members as well as professional development of faculty and staff and workforce needs of the almost 200,000 students at the regional institutions.

Dr. Barlow is familiar with leading multiple activities. She was the 88th Air Base Wing and Installation Commander, Wright-Patterson Air Force Base (WPAFB), OH. In that role, she commanded one of the largest air base wings in the Air Force with more than 5,000 Air Force military, civilian, and contractor employees. Dr. Barlow retired from active duty with the US Air Force as colonel in 2014.

Dr. Barlow was commissioned in 1988 as a distinguished graduate of Georgetown University, Washington, DC. Following graduation, she was assigned to her first of 13 assignments spanning the world.

Dr. Barlow earned a Bachelor of Psychology degree from Georgetown University, Washington, DC; Master of Clinical Psychology degree from Chapman University, Orange County, CA; and Ph.D. from Rice University, Houston, TX. She also earned masters degrees in Military Operational Art and Science, Air Command and Staff College, AL, and in National Security, Industrial College of the Armed Forces, Washington, DC.

#### Annual Meeting & 2019-2020 Officers!

The Society held its annual meeting on July 25th 2019, but with several changes from previous years. Due to the demise of the Tobias-Zimmer barn in Wartinger Park, the members visited the City's new large meeting room in Lofino Plaza. No, there was not an ice cream social, but lots of fattening goods (and bottled water) were available to the approximately 40 members and several guests.

The primary business was the election of officers for the 2019-2020 year. Three of the current officers were willing to be placed in nomination; one nomination was received for Secretary (Karen Wolf



was not running again). With no further nominations, the slate was elected by acclamation: President Mark Wiley; Vice-President Roger Coy; Treasurer Wendy Kirchoff; and Secretary Mary Jane Henry.

A report on Wartinger Park was presented by Beavercreek Assistant Parks Superintendent Zach Wike. The park is now open to the public! All tree debris has been removed and there is little damage to the other buildings; landscaping needs work. (Editor's Note: Further progress reports have been made since the annual meeting.) That means the fall sessions of Living History will proceed in October with minimal modification; obviously the barn can't be used.

Apparently discussions are underway about whether to rebuild the barn in some form, or merely to build a covered pavilion on the site's foundation. Of course, the barn was owned by the City and is the City's responsibility. Any reconstruction or other use of the area is up to the City, with consideration of the insurance and the Park's budget. Stay tuned.

Speaking of the barn, the featured program for the evening was a fascinating and sometimes suspenseful video of the 1996 moving of the barn to the park from the Zimmer farm (previously the Tobias farm; hence the hyphenated "Tobias-Zimmer" barn).

The video featured narration by participants, including historical insights by owner Bob Zimmer, accompanied by his dog and even his granddaughter. AND,



Bob himself was present at the meeting, watching his somewhat younger self.

So in the space of two months we have seen the barn on its original property and 1996 condition, to its restored condition at Wartinger Park, to its catastrophic demolition by the Memorial Day tornado. With optimism we hope that the barn may rise again. Ah, history!

#### Fall Living History is on!

Despite the Memorial Day tornado destroying the Tobias-Zimmer barn, the Living History Program conducted by volunteers for the Beavercreek Historical Society will go on as planned. Monday, September 16th, 2019 marked the beginning of the educational program for Beavercreek third graders from Main, St. Luke, Trebein and Valley Elementary schools. Students will experience what life may have been like for the early settlers of Beavercreek. The students will participate in six chores including gardening, making a rag doll, quilting, spinning yarn, finger knitting and making butter. Dunnigan Hardware is having moving sales both before and after their October 18th move to their new store. Probably will have lots of Christmas ideas.

Ah, two of my old faves: Frosty root beer or Orange Crush, a six-pack (of glass bottles of course), 49¢.

Incorporation is stagnant, tied up in courts over the proposed incorporation of Valleywood. But my Jaycees are selling "Merchant Books" to raise funds. (Bringing that forward: Legal fees were the greatest expense of our lengthy litigious incorporation.)

A grocery ad titled "Your Trick or Treat Center" is touting ground beef at 69¢ a pound. I know we didn't always give out candy, but ...

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#### Will and Testament of Jacob Darst

A handwritten will signed by Jacob Darst confirmed in 1852 was found in the files of Jack (John) Darst—the last of the Darst family—by wife Betty Darst. Betty had been doing research prior to donating an original chair from the schoolhouse on Grange Hall Road and Indian Ripple Road when she found the will. Fascinated by the beautiful handwriting and subject, Betty went on to transcribe the document as best as she could make of the writing. With no punctuation and lengthy repetitive paragraphs, parts of the document were hard to decipher.

Jacob Darst came to the Beavercreek area in 1804 after serving in the American Revolution. He and wife Mary Darst had owned extensive land in the area of Darst Road east of Indian Ripple. After Mary's death, Jacob married Ruhannah Darst who is listed as his widow on the will. The will details how his property and wealth will be distributed between his wife Ruhannah and their 12 children.

Proceedings were held in the Probate Court before Judge James W. Harper on June 16, 1852. The last will and testament was witnessed by Frederick Hawker and Charles Long. It is established that Ruhannah is of sound mind and memory in agreeance with the will of her husband.

In the will, son-in-law David Huston and son Abraham Darst have been appointed as executors. It is established that all debts and funeral expenses will be paid by the executor(s).

Wife Ruhannah is to receive one hundred dollars out of the first money collected after death, as well as one horse including a buggy and harness. She will also receive the following: a cooking stove; kitchen furniture and kitchen ware; sitting room furniture; 4 beds; a desk; and other unnamed articles.

It is mentioned that she will have the pick of the first six books in Darst's collection, with the remaining books divided amongst their 12 children. She will receive one clock, with the other clock to be sold.

It is established that Ruhannah will be supported by son Henry C. Darst. Henry is given access to use the property she is given as he wishes when she is not using it, including the horse and buggy and house she will be living in, under the stipulation that he supports her through widowhood or maternal life.

Additionally the will lists property that is to be sold to pay for debts as far as they can be, and if any money is leftover from foregoing demands it would go to the remainder of the Darst children (and their heirs) in money upwards to five hundred dollars each.

In addition to the will, Betty also found a donation of land document granted by Jacob and Ruhannah Darst on April 6th, 1849 (pictured to the right). The donation was in reference to the Mt. Zion UCC Church that the Darst family was active in. Again, Ruhannah has approved this document and was of sound mind and agreement at the time of the signing.

Betty has donated the documents to the Wright State Archives for preservation. Thanks goes to her for sharing a personal piece of her family's history.


